Session 5 – Policy proposal on restoration (group work)

11:10-12:30 **Breakout group discussion** on the 4 session topics to identify the key points related to their topic to be framed in a policy proposal for the CBD workshop.

Participants would be divided into four breakout groups, brainstorming and discussing a topic each. Facilitators/rapporteurs would be identified in advance, and other means would be also be employed to ensure that key elements of all discussions are captured.

12:30-14:00 *Lunch break*

14:00-15:20 **Reports back to plenary**
Facilitators/rapporteurs would have around 10 minutes available to report back on key issues arising in the discussions, followed by a 10

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minutes discussion with the plenary. Those reporting need not repeat what others have already said when reporting on the same topic, but can build on earlier reports. Following all reports on a specific topic, time would be available for further comment and discussion

15:20–15:30 Coffee break

15:30-16:15 Break-out group framing and drafting of a policy proposal

Each breakout group will take over the topic covered by another group to frame and draft a policy proposal corresponding to the points discussed. Distribution of the topics to each group will be done after the report back to the plenary of the brainstorming session.

16:15-17:00 Plenary presentation of the policy drafts

Presentation of the policy proposal framed by a rapporteur from each group. The rapporteur will be a different person from the brainstorming breakout group session.

17:00-18:00 Wrap-up comments and conclusions. Synthesis of the 4 topics proposals in a single policy proposal document. Consideration of implications of discussion for future meetings of the restoration consultation, Identification of next steps, closing of the conference

This session would clarify that the policy proposal would be based on both meeting discussion and background documents, and would be presented as a resource for further use during the CBD workshop and not as a consensus document. It would be made available for review. The session would also identify any potential follow up work that might be useful. In both cases timelines would be defined.

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
